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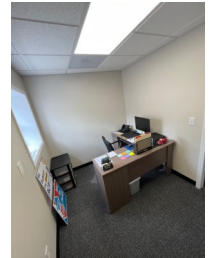

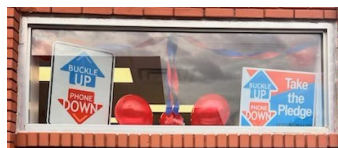

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING AND ROADWAY SAFETY

The NWMO RCOG continues to serve as the leading voice for regional transportation planning in northwest Missouri and remains a steadfast supporter and facilitator of communication between the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) and the cities and counties of northwest Missouri. In support of regional transportation, the NWMO RCOG staff develops and executes an annual transportation work plan designed to allow local, grassroots input to statewide transportation planning.

Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC)

To assist with this planning, the Transportation Advisory Committee, or TAC, serves as a standing committee of the NWMO RCOG Executive Board. The TAC is comprised of elected officials, city and county representatives, and local citizens from the region's five counties, and serves as the heart of local planning efforts. The committee meets on a quarterly basis and assists in the identification of regional needs for transportation infrastructure, public education, and safety in MoDOT's Northwest District.

Multi-Modal Stakeholder Group

This year, MoDOT has asked us to form a Multi-Modal Stakeholder group for our region. The group will be set up as a subcommittee to our TAC and will focus on identifying multi-modal projects for MoDOT's high priority unfunded needs list. MoDOT provided a list of potential stakeholders to engage with as we form this group. The Multi-Modal Stakeholders group will meet twice a year.

Northwest Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety

For the past 18 years, the Regional Council has served as a member of the Northwest Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety (Blueprint), which strives to decrease the number of deaths and injuries on our roadways. The group meets bi-monthly. Regional Council staff serves on the Blueprint Grant Scoring Committee and has a spot on the Impaired Driving Subcommittee.

Roadway Safety Education Program

As we moved into our second program year, much has changed. Learning from the things we learned in our first year, our program has made some changes. Accessibility has been our number one focus. Seeing the communication from the schools worked with during the 2023-24



school year, our program reached out and got feedback to see how we could improve. Newly, we have built program catalogs outlining the capabilities of our program. This gives the schools the opportunity to build a road safety program specific to their needs and availability. All are welcome to reach out and participate.

Through the beginning of this program year, we have seen a lot of success with outreach as well. Having connected with multiple schools so far and having our foot in the door with more we are seeing continual growth throughout. Our program has held presentations based on the initial introductory presentations as well as combining topics together for specific programs like Red Ribbon Safety week. We hope to continue with doing seatbelt checks and other events to give students hands on experience



and takeaways to spread the idea of roadway safety in their communities.

Beyond presentations and school outreach, we have seen great work with other events. Most recently seeing great success with our annual Buckle Up Phone Down day event. Coming around every October, this statewide day projects every focus of our program. Following key objectives like seatbelt safety and distracted driving, our event falls perfectly aligned with schools in our area. Setting up a booth at the Northwest Missouri State University football tailgate on the morning of November 2nd (Just 3 days after the state recognized BUPD Day), we provided information and fun games and activities to those enjoying the tailgate. Spreading information regarding the annual day, program, and Missouri's new Hands-Free Phone Down law, and even more so letting volunteers use the impairment goggles to

experience impairment through driving simulators and just casual playing of cornhole, we tried to spread awareness and pure knowledge as we do with our presentations. Focusing on all aspects of our program the event was a success, and we hope to do more like it throughout the year.

In the background of all of that, we are keeping up with our social media presence continuing to gain followers and traction within the social media community. Including pictures and videos is important because it shows students and adults alike everyone that has been participating in our program urging them to, as well. Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A).

Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments was awarded \$393,971 of funding last year through U.S. DOT's FHWA's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Program to create a region wide safety action plan. The SS4A grant program provides funding that is intended to directly support regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries. NWMO RCOG's Amy Dowis worked hard at the beginning of 2024 to execute our grant agreement with the U.S. DOT. With the

start of the new fiscal year in July, NWMO RCOG hit the ground running to begin on the SS4A project. Behind the scenes, Amy Dowis, Sarah Basore, Abigail Baker, and Breann Simmons have been working hard laying the foundation for a successful project. We are working on the RFQ to find a consultant to conduct the safety analysis of the project. During the TAC Board's 2nd quarter meeting and the NWMO RCOG Executive Board's quarterly meeting, a SS4A update will be presented to refamiliarize the counties and community with the project, with the anticipation of beginning stakeholder meetings and public engagement in the new year. The NWMO RCOG will sign a resolution committing to a goal and timeline for eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries by either establishing a target data for achieving zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries or an ambitious percentage reduction of roadway fatalities and serious injuries by a specific date with an eventual goal of eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries.

NWMO RCOG intends to focus on utilizing principles taught and recommended the U.S. DOT's Safe System Approach and Road to Zero program as well as the Missouri Department of Transportation's Show-Me Zero plan recommendations.

NWMO RCOG wants to develop a comprehensive safety action plan that is community-driven, fact-driven, and that will lead to decrease of roadway fatalities and serious injuries in our five counties. In development of this safety action plan, we seek to excite the community and begin changing the driving culture in our region. The Regional Council is excited about these achievements and opportunities and knows a Safe Streets for All Grant for developing a compressive safety action plan is the next step in our goals to decrease roadway fatalities and serious injuries in our five counties.



SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

About the Solid Waste District Region A. The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District (SWMD), serving Region A, encompasses a five-county area alongside the Regional Council, ensuring local communities and governments enjoy seamless access to waste education services. The RCOG staff plays a pivotal role in administering,



educating, and executing the Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management Plan. As one of 20 Solid Waste Management Districts under the oversight of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, the SWMD is guided by local leaders who are appointed to the Full

Council, Executive Board, and Advisory Committee. The district's primary objective is to enhance recycling initiatives within our region while promoting the principles of "reduce, re-use, and recycle."

FY '24 Grant Call.

Reimbursement grant funds are distributed annually through a competitive application process. During each grant cycle, the Advisory Committee carefully evaluates the submitted applications and provides recommendations to the Executive Board. The Executive Board is responsible for assessing and ranking these applications to allocate funding for impactful community projects. Eligible projects must focus on reducing waste in local waste streams and promoting recycling initiatives. Grants can be utilized for a wide range of activities, including, but not limited to, waste diversion efforts, enhancing recycling opportunities, conducting market research and development, compost collection and processing, and providing educational programs on recycling practices. District funds have also supported various innovative projects, such as the development of outdoor classrooms, installation of rubberized surfaces for tracks and playgrounds, and the expansion of recycling businesses. For Fiscal Year 2024, we conducted a grant call, receiving eight applications encompassing both Plan Implementation and District Operations. With the available funding, six of these applications were successfully awarded, totaling \$98,654.91

FY '24 Solid Waste District Highlights. The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District is committed to enhancing the recycling infrastructure throughout the region. This effort includes increasing the availability of community collection bins and establishing a comprehensive network of disposal sites. In Fiscal year 2024, we organized four Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection events, which served over 100 residents and successfully diverted more than 2.5 tons of hazardous waste from the local waste stream.



To promote environmental awareness and sustainability, Plan Implementation (PI) funds were allocated to conduct educational events in elementary schools across the five-county area, with a specific focus on composting. Collaborating with representatives from the University of Missouri Extension, we delivered engaging presentations to 4th and 5th grade students. Each participating school received a composting bin along with educational materials on composting practices. Additionally, fiscal year 2024 saw the expansion of recycling capabilities and infrastructure, facilitated by various grants aimed at bolstering our community's environmental efforts.

SWMD Grant Funded Projects

A2024-001 - District Operations - \$40,000

District A managed all daily and fiscal operations, including the administration of district grants, the preparation of quarterly reports, and the submission of the annual report. The District Operations budget supports staff wages and benefits, enabling the team to engage in education outreach, attend important meetings, and collaborate with the local community on waste reduction initiatives.

A2024-002 - Plan Implementation - \$7,500

Educational outreach events were conducted in schools throughout the five-county region, featuring 1-hour presentations led by Jim Crawford, a knowledgeable educator from the University of Missouri Extension. These engaging sessions targeted 4th and 5th grade students, focusing on the principles and benefits of composting. In addition to the presentations, each participating school received a compost bin and a selection of informative books on composting, enabling them to deepen their understanding and practical experience with this essential environmental practice.

A2024-003 - NWMSU Bearcat Residence Hall Recycling Stations - \$7,369

Originally intended as a grant for composting lifters and dumpers, this project has been transformed to focus on new recycling stations for student residence halls. The revised recycling stations will feature clearer signage to help residents understand what materials can and cannot be recycled. The initiative aims to enhance participation in the campus recycling program and significantly reduce the contamination levels that have been a challenge in the past. By fostering better awareness and understanding, we hope to create a more sustainable and environmentally friendly community on campus.

A2024-004 - Nodaway County Recycling Concrete Pad - \$19,500

Nodaway County Recycling is dedicated to enhancing its operations to better serve the community. To facilitate the ongoing commitment to sustainability, this grant provided the addition of a paved surface for recycling trailers for drop-off materials at the facility. This upgrade will significantly improve accessibility for drop-offs, minimized contamination from muddy conditions, and expand the storage capacity for recyclable materials. In Fiscal Year 2024, the center successfully recycled over 375 tons of materials, demonstrating their strong commitment to promoting responsible recycling practices and protecting the environment.

A2023-005 - Grant City Park Improvement Project - \$5,285.91

Grant City took significant steps to enhance its community park, aiming to create a cleaner and more inviting environment for residents. The initiative involved replacing aging picnic tables with new, eco-friendly models crafted from recycled materials. Additionally, the city installed modern trash bins integrated with separate recycling compartments to promote responsible waste disposal.

To ensure that residents were informed about these improvements and encourage to utilize the new recycling options, educational flyers were distributed alongside city utility bills. This outreach effort not only highlighted the enhancements made to the park but also fostered a greater awareness of recycling practices within the community. Through these initiatives, Grant City is committed to building a sustainable future while enriching the quality of life for its residents.

A2024-006 - HHW Vendor Pick-Up - \$15,338.09

In 2016, the Nodaway County Commission established a permanent Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Site at the Nodaway County Maintenance Barn, located at 1516 East Halsey St., Maryville, MO 64468. This facility serves the 39 communities across our five-county region, providing a vital resource for responsible disposal of hazardous household materials. During fiscal year 2024, the site hosted four collection events, ensuring that residents had ample opportunities to safely dispose of their hazardous waste.

Funding for these collections was made possible through this grant that covered the costs associated with HAZWOPER-certified personnel, who managed the intake of materials on collection days. The grant also provided necessary containers, transportation of the HHW waste to a licensed facility.

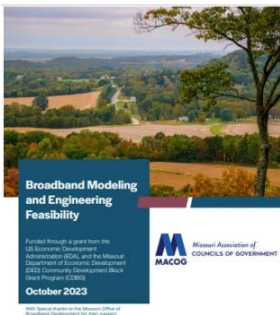
Additionally the Regional Council played a crucial role in raising public awareness about household hazardous waste, providing educational outreach to inform the community about safe disposal practices and the importance of responsible waste management. Together, these efforts contribute to a cleaner and safer environment for all residents.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Department of Commerce-Economic Development Administration (EDA) federally recognizes the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Government's five-county region as an Economic Development District. As part of that designation, EDA supports the Regional Council with an annual partnership planning investment, which is used to facilitate the development, implementation, and revision of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). The 2018-2023 EDS was adopted on October 25, 2018. Since the plan's adoption, the Regional Council and its partners have worked on several projects featured throughout this report related to the document's goals to help northwest Missouri grow and prosper.

The NWMO RCOG and partners have spent the last year working on the 5-year update to the CEDS. The 2024-29 CEDS has gone through a 30-day public comment period and has been submitted to EDA for their review on December 2. Once it's been improved the final document will be available on our website at www.nwmorcog.org.

Broadband Planning



Advocating for broadband must be backed up by regional and local planning to access the funding available with providers. To assist the local regional planning commissions with our state association, the Missouri Association of Council of Governments (MACOG) applied for and

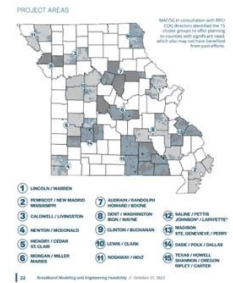
received federal and state funding to conduct a broadband modeling and feasibility study.

The study looked at 47 rural counties that were organized into 15 geographic clusters. In northwest Missouri, these three clusters examined Holt and Nodaway

Counties, Caldwell and Livingston Counties in the Green Hills area, and Clinton and Buchanan Counties in the Mo-Kan Regional Planning or St. Joseph areas.

This document provides a great introduction to broadband planning and potential areas that could benefit from projects. However, this report was completed just before the ruling that areas served by local legacy telephone providers who opted into the Alternative Connect America Cost Model (ACAM) program would be considered not eligible for BEAD funding.

This report can be accessed by contacting your local regional planning commission. The MACOG study provides a good starting point for local planning efforts aimed at enhancing digital connectivity and bridging the digital divide. Communities (counties and cities) wishing to gain a broader perspective on broadband access, equity, and literacy in their area have two local planning efforts that can access.



The first is the Digitally Connected Communities Guide facilitated by the University of Missouri Extension is a framework that can assist communities in identifying the broadband needs of their community through community forums, a community and business needs survey, speed tests, and interviews with ISPs providing service or interested in providing service to the community. Together these tools assist the community in forming a community vision statement and goals to enhance/improve broadband assets in their community that create a broadband plan ready for implementation. For the last couple of years, the Regional Council has invested in local broadband planning efforts. In July 2022, after working to complete the Digitally Connected Communities Guide framework, our organization released the Northwest Missouri Broadband Plan.

The plan was a great opportunity to learn from local providers about their efforts to build out the fiber network and how we could support their efforts. We did create a goal of 100% broadband coverage by 2028 for the five-county region based on our planning efforts and upcoming funding opportunities. In addition, we set goals to create or support programs that would support adoption through digital equity (access and affordability) as well as digital literacy.

As we near the two-year mark and head of BEAD and DEA funding opportunity it became apparent that we needed to update our plan.

Since we completed the NW MO Broadband Plan, we have continued to create opportunities with local ISPs to discuss and help position northwest Missouri to access various grant funding opportunities.



Our plan was utilized by several providers as third-party documentation of the need to construct the fiber network in northwest Missouri to obtain grant funding. In some cases, we assisted ISPs and local elected officials with discussing potential projects and assisted the local elected officials with drafting letters of support and the cash match commitment process.

Our efforts were rewarded through 17 new project announcements generating millions in private and public investments. This level of investment led to our organization evaluating the initial plan and releasing an addendum earlier this year.

Affordable Connectivity Program

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) launched the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) to close the digital divide by providing Americans in need with the opportunity to receive discounted rates on their broadband internet bill. Eligible households that take part in the program can receive a monthly credit of up to \$30 towards their internet bill (\$75 on Tribal lands). The Regional Council was rewarded with a grant to assist in outreach efforts for ACP, to spread awareness about the program in the five counties and increase enrollment rates. The ACP project was so successful, it ran out of money within the first year of operating and closed early.

Childcare and Labor Study

NWMO RCOG staff assisted the City of Maryville and Nodaway County with an EDA grant application for funds to conduct a Childcare Study as well as a Labor Shed Study in Nodaway County. This application was awarded funds. A consultant has been selected for the project.

Other Projects

Hazard Mitigation Planning. Hazard mitigation is how communities, businesses and citizens can reduce the impacts of a disaster by acting before a hazard event occurs. The first action necessary to reduce the effects of a disaster is the preparation and implementation of a mitigation strategy presented through a hazard mitigation plan. This effort is completed by coordinating meetings among local elected officials, school district officials, local citizens, and representatives from businesses and service agencies to review goals, objectives and achievable actions that will address their community’s vulnerabilities in the occurrence of a natural disaster. In October 2024, NWMO RCOG staff completed the 5-year update to the Atchison County plan and submitted it to SEMA for their review. It has since been sent from SEMA to FEMA for final approval.



NWMO RCOG staff has assisted several jurisdictions with Hazard Mitigation Grant projects by helping administer the completion of the projects to ensure the state and federal guidelines are followed. Worth County’s emergency generator project concluded May 14, 2024. Information about it and the other HMGPs we are working on can be found on the chart below:

Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission.

Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission is well underway with construction of the regional water system. The finished project will provide drinking water to the cities of Cameron and Maysville to ensure more reliable access to affordable, clean drinking water during drought related times. The

Northwest Regional Council continues to provide support to the Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission, serving as the administrative agent for the Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission. The project includes the installation of 36-Miles of Pipeline and Two Master Meter Vaults, the erection of a 450,000-gallon Ground Water Storage Tank, Package Pump Station at the east edge of St. Joseph, Missouri and, the erection of a 300,000 -gallon Elevated Water Storage Tank east of Stewartsville along Highway 136. Construction contractors who were awarded the bids included: BRB Contractors, Inc from Topeka, KS; Irvinbilt Constructors, from Chillicothe, MO and Caldwell Tanks from Louisville, KY. Missouri American Water in St. Joseph will provide the water source. The project is being funded by USDA-Rural Development, through both grant and loans. Completion is approximately 90% complete and is expected to complete construction in early 2025.



604b Water Quality Management Grant

The Regional Council was awarded a Missouri Department of Natural Resources, Water Quality Management Grant, also known as a 604(b), in July 2023 on behalf of Atchison County for the communities of Fairfax, Rock Port, and Tarkio. Lamp Rynearson, Inc., from Kansas City, MO., was selected as the engineering firm to complete a feasibility Study on the community's wastewater systems.

The project's overall goal is to determine the feasibility of developing a regional wastewater system in the designated project area. A kick-off meeting was held in April 2024. The engineer continues researching different improvement alternatives, cost estimates for each alternative, regionalization alternative maps are being made, consolidated WWTP alternatives have been explored, and potential site location and pumping from current facilities. This project ends 6/30/2025.
