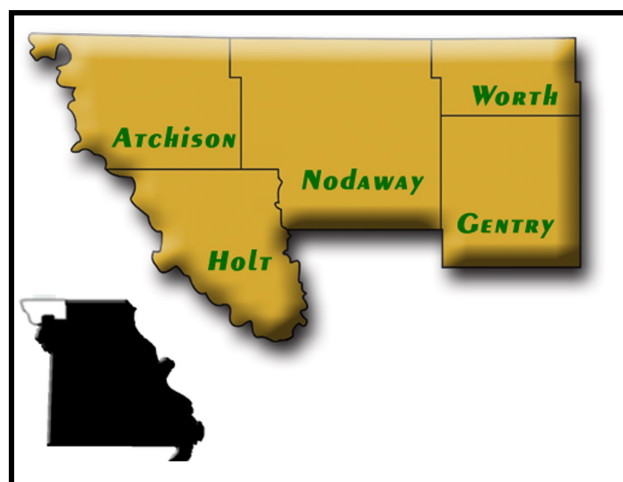


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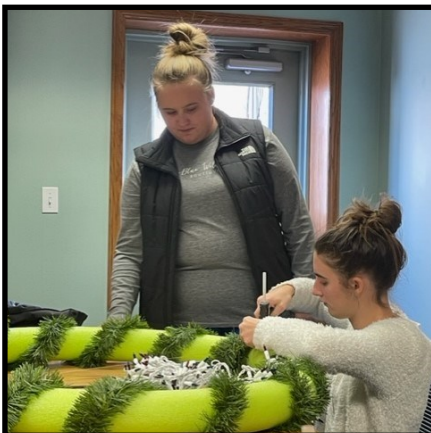


FROM THE RCOG

Kim helped the City of Mayville with a 2022 RAISE grant application that was funded to complete the South Main Corridor Improvement Project—Phase 2; staff worked together to complete SEVEN Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program planning grant applications; Intern Sarah wrote two TAP Grants that were funded, Steve kept our technology working during all the madness; and Rita continued to help folks find jobs and employers find workers. We had 4 different Solid Waste Planners, hired 3 new interns and one intern was promoted to a regular employee status when Cheyenne was hired as our new Fiscal Officer. TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

The Regional Council continues to serve as the leading voice for regional transportation planning in northwest Missouri, and remains a steadfast supporter and facilitator of communication between MoDOT and the cities and counties of northwest Missouri. In support of regional transportation planning, the Regional Council develops and executes an annual transportation work plan designed to allow local, grassroots input to statewide transportation planning.

To assist with this planning, the Transportation Advisory Committee, or TAC, serves as a standing committee of the Northwest Missouri Regional Council's Board of Directors. The TAC is comprised of elected officials, city and county representatives, and local citizens from the region's five counties, and serves as the heart of local planning efforts. The Committee meets on a quarterly basis, and assists in the identification of regional needs for transportation infrastructure, public education, and safety in MoDOT's Northwest District.

The Regional Council shares a speed trailer with MoKan and Green Hills RPC's. The speed trailer can be deployed to gather data and assist with traffic calming efforts throughout the region. Additionally,

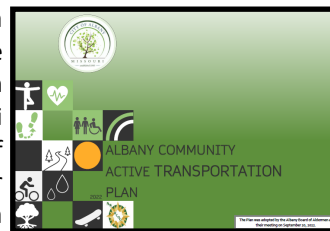
For the past 17 years, the Regional Council has served as a leading member of the Northwest Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety (Blueprint), which strives to decrease the number of deaths and injuries on our roadways. Regional Council staff has helped plan and host multiple roadway safety events at area schools and Northwest Missouri State University.

This year, the Regional Council has worked on some special projects within Transportation Planning. We applied for and were awarded a

Community Active Transportation Plan through the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services to write a Community Active



Transportation Plan for a town in our region. The Regional Council worked with the City of Albany and created a plan that was approved by the Albany City Council and will be used to help guide sidewalk improvements and other active transportation projects in the future.

The Regional Council is currently working on the 5-year update to the Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan for our five counties. This plan is an effort to maintain and improve transit alternatives



throughout the area. It is a plan that is developed and coordinated locally and mandated by

the federal government for transit funding. The update process includes: updating the list of transportation providers, hosting stakeholders meetings, a transit rider survey and a transit provider survey, and creation of transit-related strategies, action items and challenges. MoDOT contracts with Regional Planning Commissions to conduct the plan updates. The plan, for our region, expires in January 2023.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Hazard Mitigation Planning. Hazard mitigation is the means by which communities, businesses and citizens can reduce the impacts of a disaster by taking action before a hazard event occurs. The first action necessary to reduce the effects of a disaster is



the preparation and implementation of a mitigation strategy presented through a hazard mitigation plan. This effort is completed by coordinating meetings among local elected officials, school district officials, local citizens, and representatives from businesses and service agencies to review goals, objectives and achievable actions that will address their community's vulnerabilities in the occurrence of a natural disaster. In 2022, FEMA approved the 5-year updates to the Holt County and Worth County Hazard Mitigation Plans and the Regional Council submitted the AMEC plan to SEMA/FEMA for approval.

Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission.

Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission is to begin construction of the regional water system in early September to provide drinking water to Cameron and Maysville citizens to ensure a more reliable access to affordable, clean drinking water during drought related times. The Northwest Regional Council continues to provide support to the



Great Northwest Wholesale Water Commission, serving as the administrative agent for the joint municipal utility. The Commission opened construction bids in December 2021. Bid 1) 36-Miles of Pipeline and Two Master Meter Vaults; Bid 2) 450,000-gallon Ground Water Storage Tank, Package Pump Station, and Site Improvements; and Bid 3) 300,000-gallon Elevated Water Storage Tank and Site Improvements. Bids were awarded to BRB Contractors, Inc from Topeka, KS; Irvinbilt Constructors, from Chillicothe, MO and Caldwell Tanks from Louisville, KY. Missouri American Water

in St. Joseph will provide the water source. This project is being funded by USDA-Rural Development, through both grant and loans.

604b Water Quality Management Grant.

The Regional Council was once again awarded a Water Quality Management Grant, also known as a 604(b), on behalf of the Village of Big Lake, City of Craig and Big Lake State Park. Snyder & Associates, St. Joseph, MO was selected as the engineering firm to complete a Preliminary Engineering Report. The project's overall goal is to determine the feasibility of developing a regional wastewater system in the designated project area. Objectives of the project are to: 1) examine and evaluate viable alternatives, including costs; 2) establish the boundaries for regional wastewater treatment; and 3) project positive effects of improved wastewater treatment on the local and regional environment and economy. The first community meetings were held in early March of 2022 as an informational meeting. The second meetings will be held in early 2023 to update on the progress of the project and lastly, the third meetings to present the Feasibility Study to each community. This project ends 9/30/2023.

BUILD Maryville South Main Corridor Improvement Project.

The Maryville South Main Corridor Improvement Project funded by the Federal Highway Administration (\$10.4 million Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development or BUILD grant) was delayed due to bids for the project coming in well above the project estimates. Due to these increased costs, the project scope which originally ran from South Avenue to U.S. Highway 71 bypass, now will encompass a shorter route from South Avenue to State Route V. This change in scope required a revised agreement to be drafted between the City of Maryville and the Federal Highway Administration which in turn pushed back the original construction start date of March 1, 2021, to October, 2021. The City has contracted with the Regional Council to offer administrative services throughout the project, which is expected to take 12-15 months to complete.

SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

About the Solid Waste District Region A. The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District (“SWMD”), Region A, serves the same five-county region as the Regional Council, providing local communities and governments easy access to waste education technical services.



RCOG staff provide administration, education, and implementation of the Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management Plan. It is one of 20 Solid Waste Management Districts operating with oversight provided by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. The SWMD is directed by local leaders appointed to participate on the Full Council, Executive Board and Advisory Committee. Its goal is to educate and support recycling efforts in our region, and to encourage “reduce, re-use & recycle”.

FY '22 Grant Call. Reimbursement grant funds are available each year through a competitive application process. For each grant call, the Advisory Committee reviews the grant applications and makes recommendations to the Executive Board. The Executive Board then evaluates, and ranks grant applications to award grant funds for community projects. Eligible projects must address reducing the amount of waste entering local waste stream and/or facilitating recycling. Funds can be used for various projects, including but not limited to waste diversion, creating opportunities for recycling, creating new market research and development, collection and processing of compost, and providing education on recycling. District funds have also been used for outdoor classrooms, rubberized track and playground surfaces and recycling business

expansion. One grant call was held for FY'22. Ten grant applications were received, including Plan Implementation and District Operations. Due to available funding, eight of the ten were funded with a total of \$74,459.79.

FY '22 Solid Waste District Highlights. The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District continues to support the growing recycling infrastructure that provides increased collection bin availability at the community level and a network of collection sites to encourage proper disposal Collection site. Seven HHW collections were held in FY '22, serving 106 residents and diverting over 4 ton of household hazardous waste from entering the local waste stream. Plan



Implementation (PI) funds were utilized to produce two :15 second ads covering the topics of reducing contamination and how and where to recycle.

These ads were distributed through digital streaming, directly to communities within our district that were identified through zip codes. The ads were considered successful, with a Video Completion Rate or VCR (the % of users who completed the video) of 88.33% which is well above the industry average of 65%. PI added to more books to the growing collection that has been provided for schools in the five-county region. These books were “100 Things to Recycle and Make” and “Recycled Craft Projects”. To go along with the books, the SWMD sponsored a contest with a prize being awarded in two categories – the most creative project and the project with the best recycling message. Each school was able to submit one entry in each category.

A2022-002 - Plan Implementation - \$7,500

The Recycling Series books were delivered to the schools. Earth Day contest had good participation and some very creative projects. Participation recycling bookmarks were given along with prizes at each school for the Best Recycling Message and the Most Creative. The top projects are posted on the Regional Council website. Project closed 6/30/22.

A2022-003 - HHW Vendor Pick-up- \$19,500.00

Signs were installed at the HHW site. Albany hosted a collection and the Maryville site had a big collection with a total of 49 participants and over 1 ton of materials collected. Clean Harbors completed the processing and pick up of materials. Project closed 6/30/22.

A2022-005 - Holt County Recycling Collection – \$9,845.00 – TTL project \$12,525.00 – revised to \$13,272.00

This grant request is for the purchase of 2 enclosed trailers – 1 for Mound City and 1 for Oregon - to be used for collection, storage and transport of recyclables collected at various sites throughout the county. Use of enclosed trailers will allow the materials to remain dry during storage and delivery to the recycling center whereby maintaining the integrity of the materials. Project to close 6/30/23.

A2022-006 - Nodaway County Recycling – \$19,500.00 – TTL project \$23,396.00

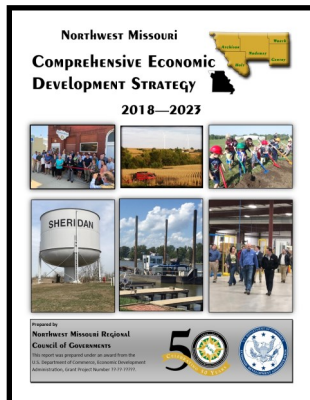
This grant request is for site improvements to enhance the safety and security of the current recycling operation facility. Funds were used to upgrade the current recycling facility by removing the old, broken-up concrete and finishing out the concrete pad for a full concrete entrance. Grant funds will be utilized to create a building entrance with the addition of five 12'/12' doors with locks and openers. A metal roof was added, the building painted, windows replaced and new garage doors installed. The site collects e-waste, white goods, and metals. Project closed 6/30/22.

A2022-008 - Stanberry R-II – Bulldog Recycling Initiative – \$5,025.09 – TTL Project \$7,366.09

This project was well received and implemented with good student/community participation in organizing collections and processing materials. The project purchased items made from recycled materials to showcase recycled plastics can be transformed into other products. Project closed 6/30/22.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Department of Commerce-Economic Development Administration (EDA) federally recognizes the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Government's five-county region as an Economic Development District. As part of that designation,



EDA supports the Regional Council with an annual partnership planning investment, which is used to facilitate the development, implementation, and revision of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). The 2018-2023 EDS was adopted on October 25,

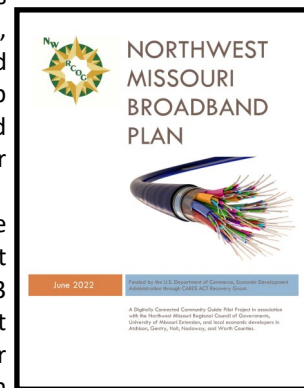
2018. Since the plan's adoption, the Regional Council and its partners have worked on several projects featured throughout this report related to the document's goals to help northwest Missouri grow and prosper. (Cover of CEDS)

EDA CARES Act-Coronavirus

The Coronavirus, also known as COVID-19, was first reported in Missouri on March 6, 2020. The long-term impacts of the virus on the regional economy are still unknown. The Regional Council was able to secure \$400,000 from EDA CARES funds to assist communities in the region to mitigate the economic impacts of COVID-19 through June 2022. As part of the grant, the Regional Council has created a Recovery Score Card to help track the economic impacts and recovery of the five-county region. To assist businesses with recovering from the impacts of the pandemic, the Regional Council contracted with Atchison County Development Corporation (ACDC), Nodaway County Economic Development (NCED), and Northwest Missouri Enterprise Facilitation (NWMEF) to operate Business Retention programs. Business Retention programs allow businesses the opportunity to work with local economic development professionals to refine their business models. Gain access to pandemic resources through government programs and access information related to the pandemic.

The need for affordable and reliable broadband service in northwest Missouri intensified with the pandemic as area residents adapted their work and shopping habits, education, and health care during the pandemic. The Regional Council contracted with the University of Missouri Extension to assist with the development of a regional broadband plan. Utilizing the Digitally Connected Communities Guide, Regional Council staff, local economic developers, and extension staff embarked on a six-month planning process. The facilitated planning process included community forums, residential and business surveys with speed testing, and interviews with local Internet Service Providers to learn about current and future projects in the region. In addition, the Regional Council contracted with MU Exceed to conduct a benefit-cost analysis for Atchison, Gentry, and Worth Counties related to economic growth potential with broadband expansion. The result of both projects was the creation of a plan to expand affordable and reliable broadband with adoption and digital equity considerations.

To help expand the feasibility of broadband to every acre in Northwest Missouri, the Regional Council has partnered with the University of Missouri System to create a P3 Broadband Business Plan competition. This summer, multidisciplinary teams of students from UM System universities will compete to develop P3 business models using surveys, research, data, and discussions to develop workable and affordable plans for infrastructure expansion and service adoption in northwest Missouri. Each P3 business plan must address strategies for increasing the adoption



of internet-based technologies and a plan to finance and construct the community's internet network. On August 20, the teams will present their proposals to a panel of judges at a public event in Maryville, Missouri. After that, the Regional Council may use the teams' plans in their broadband planning efforts.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Missouri Job Center-Maryville Program Year (PY) 2021-2022

Program Year 21-22 proved to be a challenging, but successful year. The Missouri Job Center-Maryville



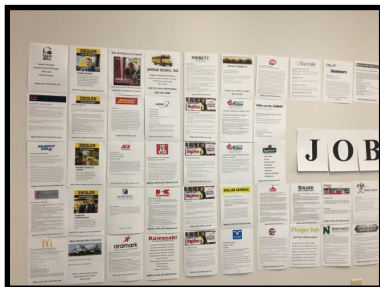
operated with one staff person, Rita Wallinga, Title I WIOA Program Director. She

was responsible for assisting job seeker walk-in traffic, WIOA adult and dislocated worker enrollments, completing required RESEA (Reemployment Services and Eligibility Assessment) for unemployment claimants, posting job orders for employers, and referrals to partner agencies/services.

Just a few stats from PY21-22:

- **206 job orders** were posted for employers from the five counties
- **39** individuals were enrolled into the **WIOA Adult** program
- **23** individuals were enrolled into the **WIOA Dislocated Worker** program
- **620 individuals utilized the job center.** This number reflects customers who utilized the resource

room for various reasons, repeat customers, and those that were here to



see partner staff (St. Joseph Youth Alliance, Vocational Rehabilitation, Equus, NWMO Enterprise Facilitation)

The Missouri Job Center staff partnered with local agencies to hold job fairs, two in Maryville and one in Albany. If you have questions

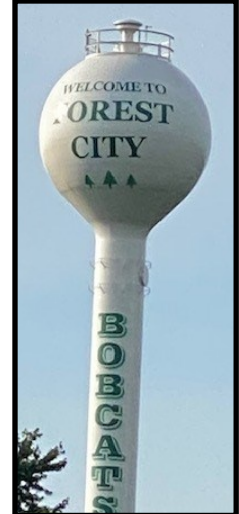

One-Stop Operator The Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments service area is part of a large eighteen-county region recognized by the State of Missouri as a Workforce Development Area. As part of this designation, the Northwest Workforce Development Board, based in Trenton, Missouri, is responsible for operating four Missouri Job Centers and implementing the workforce development system with eighteen federally mandated partners under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). To assist with the coordination of service delivery for the one-stop system among the regional partners, federal legislation mandates that the Northwest Workforce Development Board procure a One-Stop Operator.

In 2017, the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments was selected to fulfill the duties of the One-Stop Operator. Kim Mildward serves in this capacity for the Northwest Workforce Development Board. This past year, the One-Stop Operator has worked with all the federal mandated partners to provide services to businesses and job seekers during the Coronavirus pandemic. In addition, Mrs. Mildward has facilitated joint planning meetings to create business and job seeker workforce surveys, virtual and outdoor job fairs, and Empowering Employers events to help the region capitalize on new hiring and retention trends sparked by the pandemic.
